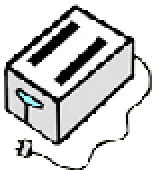
While enjoying warmer weather, please remember the following tips to keep the summer season enjoyable:

Burglaries Occur Around the Neighborhood

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There has been an increase in burglaries in the area over the past two months, encompassed by Delaware Avenue to Holland Avenue, over to New Scotland Avenue, continuing to Main, then South on S. Main to Whitehall Rd., to include all of the side streets south of Whitehall toward the Thruway. We have seen a few burglaries just outside of this area, too. Most of these burglaries are occurring during the day.

The method of entry includes entering through unlocked doors, damaging windows on doors to gain access to locks, and breaking basement windows. Jewelry and coins appear to be the most common items stolen.

You may see an increased police presence in these neighborhoods, in the form of marked police vehicles, officers on horses, and officers on bikes. There are also detectives and plainclothes officers patrolling in unmarked units. Community Services Officers are also out, advising residents about the burglaries and offering prevention tips. Since this heightened presence, the burglaries have dropped off, but residents still need to exercise some basic burglary prevention tips.

We are urging residents to call the police when they see anyone suspicious in their neighborhoods. It could be someone going door to door selling a product/service or looking for someone at a particular address; or even someone sitting in a parked car, or walking or riding a bike. Trust your instinct - if something doesn't look right, call the police.

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Highlights from the 2007 Assessment Roll

The recent rise in real estate prices in our area is showing up in the latest city assessment roll. Thanks to our own city council member, Jim Sano, who converted the 7,410-page document the city makes available to residents to a spreadsheet format, it is possible to crunch the numbers and compare values across streets and types of residences. Table 1 shows the average value and square footage for streets running through the Helderberg neighborhood by number of bedrooms. (Keep in mind that some of the data in the table are from houses on parts of those streets that stretch beyond the HNA boundaries.) The data show that the average 3-bedroom home in our area is valued at \$197,000, but values vary quite a bit by street. Generally speaking, values per square foot are lower for bigger houses. Table 2 shows that on the streets running through our neighborhood, single-

family homes tend to have much higher assessed values per square foot than two-family homes.

Keep in mind that higher valuations do not necessarily result in higher taxes. The change in taxes owed depends in part on how your valuation changes with respect to everyone else's. Even if your home appreciates a lot, your taxes could actually decrease if the overall tax levy does not rise much and your home's value is increasing more slowly than the average in the city. On the other hand, if your home's value rises more quickly than most, you will likely see an increase in your tax bills.

School Vote Scheduled for May 15

On May 15, voters will decide on the Albany City School District's \$189,535,737 budget, representing a 6.89% tax increase and an 11.57% spending increase. If approved, the 2007-8 budget proposes funding: smaller classes, continued full-day kindergartens and pre-K, after school programs, increased security and continued reconstruction of Hackett Middle School.

In addition to the school budget, voters will also choose four trustees for the Albany Library Board.

Voters in the 7th Ward will vote at the Delaware Community School (formerly School 18) on Bertha Street. Voters in the 9th ward vote at School 10 on New Scotland Ave. Polls are open from 7:00 am to 9:00 pm.
